
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Dockless bikesharing arrived in Germany: Characteristics of dockless bikesharing services in Germany






- Bikes are available within a certain service area without any stations
- Registration via smartphone/rent via QRcode
- Technically simple and robust bikes
- Simple pricing models
- Most operators started with fleets in the three-digit range
- Usually in the central districts of larger cities. First operators started in smaller cities (Bad Vilbel, Dreieich, Langen etc.)



Chances

- Complement to urban mobility choices
- First/last mile solution for intermodal mobility behavior
- Shifting short distance car trips to sustainable transport modes
- Mobility solution for small and medium sized cities

Challenges/Questions

- Business models
- Technical quality of the shared bikes
- Size of the fleet/Transport related impact
- Impact on publicly funded bikesharing services
- Communication
- Lack in clear regulation
- Reliability of the operators/services
- Fleet management
- Use of public space
